N3.0 Suicidality

- Adolescents and young adults are high risk groups
- Acknowledged problem of public health
- Is associated with, but not equivalent to, mental disorders
- Known suicide risk factors are not specific enough
 - Suicidal ideation is common, while completed suicide is rare
- There is no widely acknowledged suicidality screening protocol for professionalists working with youth
- There is no widely acknowledged intervention protocol in case of suicidal ideation being reported
 - It seems that often proffesionalists either panic or neglect the problem



Personalised prevention of noncommunicable diseases - addressing areas of unmet needs using multiple data sources

International cooperation may help in

- increasing the project impact
- distinguishing between universal and culture-specific risk factors
- distinguishing between universal and culture-specific components of interventions' efficacy
- preparing the evidence-based suicidality screening protocol, including thought digital means
- preparing evidence-based intervention/referral protocol
